Well, what a journey we've been on! To be honest, we're all running out of hyperbole to open communication like this. It seems like every email, video and phone call starts with words like "strange, unprecedented, uncertain" these days.

When we started all this, we had a decision to make about one Sunday. Do we cancel our services this week, March 15. We had planned to launch our building fundraising campaign that day, and we agonized over that decision. We didn't know at that time that we'd be having a conversation days later about postponing in-person gatherings for 30 days.

As we scrambled to transition the entirety of our ministry to an online environment we thought to ourselves, "What a strange month this will be!". As we progressed through those early weeks, we began to hear rumblings of all this potentially lasting into May. We all stared at each other in disbelief, almost unable to take that in. Now here we sit with the month of May well in the rear view mirror and almost uncomfortably familiar with what life and ministry looks like in this environment.

At this stage, we're going to provide a bit of an update with regard to how things have gone thus far, and more importantly, talk about our plans and intentions for the coming days, weeks, and months.

Plan to Progress

Church Online

Our transition to online ministry was something to behold. Our team revamped our entire web presence to reflect an online environment in a matter of days. Our worship and technical crew planned and executed a standard of online worship leading that quickly lifted us out of our fears of separation and pulled us into a shared experience of the Glory of God, even while sequestered in our own homes. Our kids and youth leadership quickly began executing online environments for our younger folks and their families with excellence and, most importantly, a high degree of care. Administratively, our team pivoted into this new world with agility, flexibility and excellence, securing available funds and resources and updating systems to support the new reality in earnest.

To analyze the experience and the interaction is a bit of a challenge and there's very little to compare it to. That said, we've been pleased to see the way folks have connected during this season. Our total video ministry - including Sundays, Kids Ministry and others - has averaged approximately 2800 views per month. Our Sunday Service videos average about 350 views each as they remain archived and available. Our live Sunday experience has averaged around 125-150 individual logins between the two services. We also know that those numbers don't tell the whole story, and many of them represent more than one person watching together. Many of the experts' best guesses suggest that a factor of 2.2 is a reasonable formula. That being the case, we can surmise that upwards of 700 people are viewing our weekly experiences, with over 300 joining us live on Sunday mornings. How great to imagine that cloud of witnesses we're part of even while physically apart! We thank God that in all this He has seen fit to enable us to continue to be the body of Christ for His glory, even in this moment.

These are all positives to take away from this season, but they are not meant to discount the real difficulties that remain. Our corporate value of "Better Together" stands, and we still believe that is best expressed in the gathered, in-person body of Christ. We grieve its loss in this moment. We acknowledge the many-faceted ways in which this has been uniquely challenging. Our approach has been to acknowledge this loss and lean into an alternative, rather than simply attempt to recreate it. We want to leave space for what we love about being together and value it by not pretending it is easily replaced. We are believing and praying for the day when our togetherness is unencumbered and free. We're asking God to show us what we've taken for granted and to steel our resolve for what matters most - to birth in us a renewed vision for the future. We firmly believe we will not be "going back" to what was, but rather "moving forward" into what is next for our community and ministry.



Plan to Progress

Our Approach

In discussing their plans for the future, Pastor John Mark Comer said to his Portland, Oregon congregation, "It's our desire to do not just what is legal, but what is wise,". This is a deeply resonant statement and captures the tone of our plans for the weeks and months to come.

We have been driven by a mission to serve our community and fascinate those around us with practical demonstrations of God's love. We intend to do no less as we grapple with our future plans. Our governing mission is to make choices and take action that demonstrate love and care for our neighbours and that value and make space for the least of these and the most vulnerable in our communities - even at a cost to our individual comfort and preferences.

We want to be responsible community members and heed the advice of our community leaders. We're grateful for their efforts and we continue to pray for them as they navigate decisions no one ever expected them to be faced with. No leader is perfect, but we believe the best in them and want to enable their difficult task by offering our support wherever possible. They have provided us all with clear direction as to how things in our society will progress as each stage of this journey arrives. We're all very familiar with the colour coded regulations and recommendations at this point. The challenging question for us at each stage has been, "What does this mean for churches?"

The answer to that question isn't necessarily clear cut, and is likely to be expressed differently by each congregation. We're cheering on our sister churches as they wrestle with their own plans, and we support them all as they make the best choices they can for their own flock and community, no matter how different each instance may be.



There are many angles from which to consider our progression through all this, not the least of which is the remaining uncertainty surrounding timelines and medical innovation. While our regulators have begun to open the door for restricted gatherings of a certain size, the comfort level of society at large to do so varies to a great degree. A recent poll by The Gloo Group shows little consensus in Canada. 25% of people indicate they're unsure when they'll be comfortable returning to in-person gatherings, if at all. An additional 30% said they'd rather worship at home and only return when they can be unencumbered and mask-free at church. Tony Morgan, a church leadership guru, indicated that his conversations with churches beginning to open up in the U.S. have shared they are experiencing attendance as low as 15-20% of what they would have had pre-pandemic.

We long to be together as much as anyone, and we will be. That said, we've espoused a mantra of sorts for some time now, which states, "Wherever we're going, we're going together." This has guided us through choices surrounding worship expression, ministry and programming, and life at large at Lewisville. Life at Lewisville is about everyone. With this in mind, we're faced with the short-term prospect of strange gatherings, restricted in size, spaced out over large swaths of time, cramped by safety regulations, and even the discouragement of singing. The summary question covering it all is essentially, "What does a win look like when it comes to our return to in-person services?". It's not an easy answer.

Considerations (cont.)

The answer our leadership has arrived at through much prayer and consideration is that for Lewisville, a win means getting together for inperson worship services when we can truly be together - all of us. When regulations allow for the gathered body to do so without the weight and pressure of intense safety measures; when the stakes aren't so high; when each one of us feels confident to do so.

With that in mind, we'd like to share with you Lewisville's Plan to Progress. We've mirrored our Province's colour-coded system to express our plans for moving forward into a new day. It features three stages: **Mitigation**, **Progress**, and **Renewal**.
